Dear Parent/Guardian,

When I wrote to you at half term, I had no idea that just a few weeks later all school sport would be cancelled and this would immediately be followed by school closures and a global lockdown!

Despite the abrupt end to the term's sport, please look out for the PE season report which reports on the 94 fixtures completed from January to mid-March.

Clearly competitive sport is a very distant priority in the current environment but actually the importance of exercise to maintain a healthy body and mind has never been more important. PE classes have received details from the PE Department with a number of links and ideas to consider over the coming weeks. I'm sure many students and other family members have gathered around computer screens and TV's already but please do encourage your children to have a look at the list.

There are many examples of schools and individuals who are sharing activity videos on Twitter. If anyone would like to video their efforts or take photos to have them posted on the Manwood's Sport twitter page, then please send them to c.pearce@srms.kent.sch.uk and I will post them after the Easter holidays. The previous Twitter project #Manwoodstudentsexcel went very well with 20 students being recognised in a variety of sports. Thank you to those who sent details in and if you would like to pass on any details for student success, I will look to repeat this hashtag in the future.

The premature end to school sport this term meant that leagues couldn't be finished, tournaments couldn't take place and a large number of friendly fixtures had to be cancelled. There are plans for one or two events to be moved to the summer term but of course, we currently have no idea when we will return to normality. Unfortunately, I have received emails to say that all Kent Cup School's cricket and the English Schools' Athletics competition we were entering for the first time, have been cancelled already. I think it's fair to assume that school sport won't be seen for a while yet.

On a more positive note, I would like to thank you all for your continued support of Manwood's Sport. The sports club fees ensured all pitch hire, transport, floodlight maintenance, competition entries, officials, match teas and affiliations were paid. In addition, the phenomenal number of students engaging in netball club (155) has meant that we are able to have the outdoor netball courts re-surfaced and marked over the summer to give us a higher grade playing surface for the future. Sports club fees will make up half of the costs needed to complete the work.

I have just completed an audit of participation in all of our sports clubs. This includes all lunchtime activities, the paid sports club activities and all other after-school sports clubs. So far this academic year, 428 students have chosen to take part in at least one extra-curricular activity, totalling 42% of the entire school population for 8 different sports. Bearing in mind, summer sports are currently exempt from these figures, I would expect totals to rise for those who enjoy other activities like cricket, tennis, athletics and rounders. It's also worth pointing out that many of our students take part in more than one activity with a number of students doing 4 or more!
