

Welcome to a bumper issue of the newsletter! contains reports on all of the events and activities that have taken place since Easter.




REVISED POLICY ON MOBILE PHONE USE IN SCHOOL

Thank you so much to the parents and carers who completed our survey earlier this term. The results are shown below, with that of the staff shown below that. A clear majority of parents/carers wanted there to be no change to our current policy on the use of mobile phones, whereas a clear majority of staff wanted their use to be restricted!

Having read through all of the comments that were submitted, the Senior Leadership Team then deliberated on if the policy should change. The outcome is that there will be a slight change to our current policy. As now, students will be free to bring in their mobile phones but their use will be banned inside any building – even during before school, break, lunch and after school. This means that they will be free to use them, as now, outside during those times. It is perhaps worth saying at this point, some parents seem to think that their children are glued to their phones during non-lesson times. The reality could not be further from the truth, with students fully engaged with their friends whether that be in a game involving physical activity (e.g. football, basketball, throw and catch) on the field or in animated discussion. The only time that any student will be able to use their mobile phone within a school building is with the express permission of a member of staff e.g. to take part in an online quiz, to conduct some internet research or to photograph






Staff Responses

The following is taken from the GoFundMe page of the mum of our Year 13 student who passed away earlier in this year, Max Timberlake.

"In early 2022, I lost my only child, Max. Max was not just my son - he was my best friend and soulmate, the most constant and positive force in my life, and my reason for being. Losing Max has been one of the most impossible situations I've ever had to deal with, but it has also made me more determined than ever to change the world and make it a more beautiful, kind place - the sort of place where everyone can feel the joy that Max brought me every day.

I will be holding fundraising events throughout the next few years to raise money for Papyrus - a charity set up by parents who lost their children to suicide and who want to break the cycle of young lives being lost in this way.

This will start with a sponsored 12 mile walk, from Max's home to Canterbury, one of his favourite places, in Autumn 2022. Max had a wicked sense of humour and would love to see me try to spend 5 hours walking with bright red lippy on, and so I like to think he'd be proud of this challenge I've set for myself - even if he would've been hoping I'd fall over and embarrass myself!

I never want another parent to feel the way I have felt these past few months. Young people are dying from suicide every day - and for some, like my Maxi, they have no previous history of mental health problems. It can happen to anyone. Donate whatever you can for Maxi. If you can't afford to donate, then please share it far and wide. He was the kindest, most special boy- and he deserves a legacy as beautiful as him".

The group took part in the National Theatre's *Connections Festival* by performing their show *Variations* in Sandwich and then at The Studio in the Marlowe Theatre in Canterbury in April. As a result of those performances, the group received the fabulous news that they were 1 of only 10 groups invited to perform on the Dorfman stage at the National Theatre on Thursday 30 June. The prize also involved a stay in a hotel the night before the performance and then costume design, make-up and everything else involved in a professional production. Many congratulations to these budding thespians!

The **U14 boys football team** made it through to the County Final that was held at Ramsgate Football Club on Thursday 5 May 2022, where they played Hurstmere School. The team played very well and worked hard, fighting back from 2-0 down to 2-2, but eventually losing 4-2. Hurstmere have approximately 250 boys in a year group to choose from and reached the semi-finals of the national cup this season, so it was truly a great effort from the boys. Our congratulations go to each of the team. In addition, and just as importantly, they were exemplary in their conduct throughout.

Eddie Rowney (Year 11) played for the England U16 hockey team at the recent Five Nations tournament in Holland. He had the most amazing experience at the tournament, a highlight of which was having the honour of being selected as Captain against Germany. An experience he will never forget. The photos below show Eddie in action. Since then, Eddie has been selected for the England U16 team in the 8 Nations tournament in Frankfurt (9th-17th July) and will receive his first official international cap – at which point he will become the first male Manwoodian to represent England at hockey. He has also been selected for a series versus Germany (30th June-3rd July) and for the U17 England squad for the School Games in September. A move to a Premier League club is also on the cards for him this summer too.

On Wednesday 30 June, 14 young people who attend TheatreWorks in Deal (10 of which were SRMS students – **Izzy Acarnley, Agnes Barrett, Amelia Blackman, Lily Burman, Ella Crew, Kaitlin Heyworth, James Hodge, Sadie Jarvis-Bee, Joseph Mannings, Marcus Wardle)** travelled to London to take part in the National Theatre Connections Youth Festival. The students were up against fierce competition, as they were among only 10 out of 300 drama groups nationwide chosen to perform their play on the Dorfman Stage at the National. Of the 10 students, 7 are studying GCSE Drama. The students performed a play called Variations, written by Katie Hims. The group first performed the play at the Connections partner venue, the Marlowe Theatre Canterbury, in April. Students said: "The Connections Festival has been a truly memorable experience for us from beginning to end. It has been such a privilege to participate and work together as a group to bring Variations to the stage. None of us could have ever imagined our play would be chosen to perform on stage at the National Theatre – the experience was insane!"

Mr Pearce has been at SRMS since 2004. He joined us from Sandwich Technology School and over the past 18 years has given up countless hours to after school fixtures. In addition to that, he has run two overseas sports tours to Sri Lanka and Barbados and worked tirelessly in boarding, first as the Assistant House Parent to the boys and then as the boys' House Parent. Business

On Friday 15 July the Business Department took the opportunity to complete their first trip since the Covid-19 Pandemic. The weather was unseasonably hot, especially for the British summer, therefore it made sense to take them to the seaside town of Margate and visit the infamous Dreamland Margate.

The students had a unique opportunity to tour the Dreamland Estate alongside the venue's Head of Operations, Shane Guy, who provided us insight into the eclectic mix of Attractions and Music Venues on offer. During the tour, the students were able to witness the production team for Paul Weller set up for the evenings event on the main stage and allowed them to appreciate the complexities of operating large scale events.

Following the tour, the students had the opportunity to ask questions to support their Feasibility Study Summer Project to the Chief Executive Officer, Eddie Kemsley, who provided us key information regarding the future of the site and discussed some of the important changes that had been made for the 2023 season. Finally, we were treated to a tour of the Rides by the Attractions Management, Tom and Gemma Perry, who offered a practical insight into the inner workings of Amusement Park Operations. Oh, and all students got the opportunity to ride the Bumper Cars!

Over the course of the day students had the opportunity to meet and discuss with industry professionals and allowed them to see the skills and qualities required to operate such a unique attraction. Undoubtedly this gave them insight into their wider career opportunities and enabled them to consider alternative options for their futures. The feedback from students was extremely positive, indeed the CEO has requested they see some of our students Summer Projects once completed.









Careers

As part of our commitment to providing our students with opportunities to raise aspirations, develop employability skills and make informed choices about their futures, SRMS held a Careers Fair on Tuesday 21 June for all students across all year groups.

Over 40 organisations attended the Careers Fair with employers, colleges, training providers, universities, NHS and ambassadors from a wide range of business professions all represented. Over the course of the day all students will had the opportunity to attend the Careers Fair to speak to representatives from these organisations about the skills, qualifications and experiences that they need to be successful in further learning and employment. It was a great success and added a real 'buzz' to the school day. The feedback from students, parents, staff and exhibitors was very positive. It is definitely an event we would like to do every year!



During the last week of term, the whole of Year 12 undertook a Work Experience Week. The majority of the year group took up the opportunity to be placed in external companies for the week, with the remainder engaged in careers-related activities each day in school. If you are a parent of any of these students do please encourage them to complete the other sections of their awards ensuring they have submitted their group project by the end of the academic year, and to sign up next term for the next level of the award. If they have their award signed off fully by November, they will be presented their certificate and badge at Speech Day in December.

We wish the 25 Year 12 students who are undertaking either the practice or assessed (or both!) Gold expedition during the summer holiday alongside 4 of our Bronze students who are completing their assessed expedition at the end of July.

We also received this certificate showing in monetary terms how much the combined volunteering hours (1729) done by our Duke of Edinburgh participants last year amounted to – almost £7968.

Congratulations to all participants who have completed their Volunteering section.



Earth & Sky Group

The Earth & Sky group has been meeting on Monday lunchtimes to share astronomy pictures of the stars and the moon, observe the Sun and observe wildlife around the school. On clear days, the solar telescope has been used to view sunspots, solar flares and solar filaments on the Sun's surface as it has been very active recently. The group also monitored the wildlife around a small pond which has been bursting with life since Spring - many fish can even be seen. They have also used binoculars to observe birds around the school site.

Eco Society

Fundraising update

We celebrated Earth Day on 22nd April with a fundraising quiz night - the final event of our solar panel campaign. It was wonderful to have a hall full of students, their families & staff enjoying the evening in support of the school. The evening raised £900 which gave us a final fundraising total of £75,000 for solar panels which we hope will be installed on the Sports Hall and G block roofs over the summer holidays. Thanks to everyone that supported this project which will make a huge difference to the school's carbon emissions and electricity bills. Thank you if you made a donation, whether that was coming to the quiz night, donating £1 on the non-school uniform day, buying a cake or attending the quiz. The £75,000 raised is so much more than the Eco Society imagined it could achieve when the project was started 12 months ago. The Society has been lucky to receive some really large one off donations from charities, organisations and alumni alongside the donations received from the school community, and this is how the total was comprised:

- £35,000 from two charities that awarded us grants or matched our fundraising
- £15,000 from The Open's Green Initiative
- £14,000 from alumni & parents of alumni
- £5,000 from Royal St George's Golf Club Endowment Fund
- £4,000 from parents, students and staff
- £1,000 from Sandwich Rotary



On Saturday 5 July the Eco Society ran a fundraising litter pick at the Sandwich Folk & Ale festival. The team of students and staff collected plenty of litter and raised £340 (including a donation of £200 from the festival's organising committee) which will go towards next year's priority which is to make the school more biodiverse, by planting more hedges and installing nesting boxes.

Shortlisting for the Department for Education Sustainability Award

The school's solar panel project made a shortlist of only 3 schools for the Department of Education's annual Sustainability Award. The winners will be announced on 18 October 2022. Our fingers (and toes!) are crossed for the Eco Society.



Save Our Swifts

Swifts are now on the UK red list of endangered bird species. 58% of the UKs swift population have disappeared from our skies in the last 25 years. This is, in part, due to the decline of nest sites as old buildings are refurbished. Here at Sir Roger Manwood's School we have a number of swifts which visit each summer and their distinctive cries can be heard throughout the summer months. It is in response to this that the Eco Society embarked upon a project to raise money to put up nest boxes for swifts around the school buildings.

A small group from the Eco Society visited Sandwich Bird Observatory to discuss the project and they had a visit from the wildlife film maker, Richard Taylor-Jones, who accompanied the team on a walk around the school to discuss possible nest box sites.



Since coming up with an initial plan, swifts have been observed already nesting in A block at the top of drainpipes and the team have a video of a swift leaving their nest. It is great news to find they are already nesting here as it will encourage other swifts to nest close by.

The team have raised enough money to purchase nest boxes, which will be fitted to school buildings over the summer holiday as part of other work being done. Some of the money raised is being kept to help finance any accommodation that will be needed during the A block roof replacement works take place next year. The team will need to research the best way to replace these nest sites so if anyone has any expertise in this area the team would love to hear from you.

English

Year 9 Visit to the Globe Theatre

After more than two years of not being able to take students to the theatre it was fantastic to see 52 Year 9 students travel up to London to the Globe Theatre to see the much acclaimed Royal Shakespeare Company's production of *Much Ado About Nothing*.

Students in Year 7 learn about the history of the Globe Theatre in their Introduction to Shakespeare unit, and they also study parts of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. In Year 9 they study *Much Ado About Nothing* and it was so good to be able to watch such a brilliant production in the recreated Globe Theatre. As in Shakespeare's time, the play was interactive and students were surprised to find members of the audience who suddenly became part of the cast! Set in April 1945 in northern Italy, days before the defeat of Mussolini's fascist forces, there was a sense of celebration as the heroes of war were welcomed back, with wine, singing and a troupe of accordionists. The comic scenes were slick and very funny and really brought the text to life as students could see how Shakespeare's comedy still works today in a very different context. The darker scenes were moving and tense and it was great to see our students enjoying the whole production, despite having to stand in the pit for three hours in the sunshine, just as the Groundlings would have done 400 years ago. Year 9 students behaved superbly, and enjoyed the fun of being together on the coach, and spending an hour in the sunshine on the South Bank, taking lots of photos and enjoying their picnic lunches. The English Department are excited to once again be able to plan visits to theatres, and will be looking to do so for several different year groups next year.



Author visit

Ele Fountain is the author of *Boy 87* which is a novel that the whole of Year 7 read as part of their Year 7 English curriculum. As the book really seems to engage the students, the English department thought it a good idea to invite the author to speak to the year group.

Ele was inspired to write *Boy 87* when living in Ethiopia. It's a gripping tale about a 14 year old boy forced to leave his mother and little sister and set off on a dangerous journey. The refugee crisis is obviously one the themes in this novel and the setting is actually based on Eritrea's dictatorial regime. When she spoke to the students she asked them to imagine what it might be like to have to pack a back pack one night ready to leave the following day to travel thousands of miles to a new country. The students seemed genuinely interested in her talk and asked many questions afterwards. What made this particular visit work was that the Year 7 students had just finished reading this book in lessons and so questions were fresh in their mind.

The book purchasing and signing after the talk was a success and many of her new books were bought.

On leaving, Ele mentioned that she doesn't usually travel as far as Kent but had this time as we had written to her last year and included a student's excellent creative writing piece (writing a final chapter) that she had been very impressed by.

Geography

Back in May, the Year 12 Geographers went to Hastings for their first sixth form trip since 2019. It was wonderful to be back out 'in the field' on a sunny day. It's fair to say that the students were underwhelmed by the pier but impressed by the Old Town and the recently renamed Hastings Contemporary - clearly the town is only part way through its regeneration.



History

Two Year 12 students, **Elissa Blacklock** and **Chloe Nelson**, attended the Holocaust Educational Trust's online conference earlier in the year. As a condition of attending, they had to spread what they learnt to their local community. Elissa and Chloe chose to run an interactive group of workstations with a Year 9 History class, with their lessons coinciding with the unit in the Year 9 History course on the Holocaust.

Each station focussed on a different aspect of what they had learnt during the online project:

- The lead up to the Holocaust
- Rehumanisation
- Life at Auschwitz, and
- The Holocaust's legacy.

The Year 9 class were keen, curious and conscientious. When asked questions, they were thoughtful and thought provoking, giving perspectives that the two Year 12 students had not considered, especially in the Rehumanisation work station. One student even shared their familial links to Auschwitz. Another shared how they found the concept of the Holocaust hard to comprehend - an experience that the sixth form students said they had shared during the online sessions.

Our two Year 12 students commented that the project taught them many things and they hope that the Year 9 learnt from, and appreciated, the workstations they created for them.

On Thursday 14 July Elissa and Chloe attended the Holocaust Educational Trust's Ambassador Convention in person as a thank you from the Trust for their work.

Languages

In June we were invited to take 30 Year 8 pupils to the University of Kent in Canterbury to experience workshops and activities to promote World Languages Day. The students had their first taste of what it's like to be in a University lecture theatre, then were able to attend a variety of workshops. Activities ranged from learning Swedish and Chinese to learning about Space in Spanish!





The University lecturers were enthusiastic and engaging and pupils enjoyed learning about the complexities of Latin grammar (!). A particular highlight was the workshop about Spanish food although pupils were disappointed there wasn't any to eat! The Portuguese teacher was very impressed with their pronunciation and the Classics teacher was thrilled with the creative artwork they produced while writing welcoming phrases in Latin and learning about Ovid. The Japanese group managed to learn numbers, greetings and some symbols in a short amount of time, as well as learning about the Tanabata festival. During this festival, people write their wishes on special strips of paper and tie them to bamboo trees - our pupils wrote about their wishes to travel and learn languages!

The African drumming workshop was particularly impressive, with pupils able to produce some quite complex pieces in a short amount of time. (This may well have been helped by the fact that Mr González and Mrs Morgan did not take part!)



The accompanying teachers were extremely proud to see the way our pupils embraced the opportunities to try a variety of activities.


Music

Apparently he regarded his greatest achievement in cricket whilst at school to be a hat trick against Tammy's team in Sandwich, although well before her time!

Lorna left Manwood's at the end of the 2016 academic year after being with us for 10 years, in order to move to Wales. Lorna was a Chemistry teacher and in her final few years also co-ordinated our Year 12 Enrichment and Extended Project programmes, and she (and her dog!) were very generous with their time in supporting Duke of Edinburgh expeditions.

Astroturf Pitch Fundraising Project

Introduction

It has long been an aspiration for the school to develop a full-size all-weather AstroTurf sports pitch to enhance the physical education curriculum across a whole range of sports. Whilst our sports teams are undoubtedly very successful, the restrictions placed on them in terms of access to pitches in all weathers does hamper the development of the students. An Astroturf pitch will have an impact not only on what sports we can offer but also on the quality of skill development, tactical knowledge and understanding and the students' overall enjoyment of taking part in different sports and being physically active. One of the PE department's main aims has always been to engage students in a physically active lifestyle which lasts not just for the five—possible seven years they are here at the school but for the rest of their lives; an Astroturf pitch would strengthen this aim.

What is the need?

We currently have 2 indoor teaching spaces plus a half size 20-year-old astroturf and 4 or 5 teaching groups on the timetable at any one time. This means that currently when the weather is poor (which in the current climate is in the winter and summer !!) we have to double up the outdoor group with one of the indoor groups– which is not ideal and has an impact on students' learning and progress. A summary of other uses and benefits includes:

- Currently our capacity for students to play hockey games and undertake training is limited.
- Travel to Polo Farm takes too much time and adds extra costs to the fixtures budget.
- An astroturf pitch would provide space for additional tennis coaching
- An astroturf pitch would provide space for football and rugby skills coaching, protecting the grass pitches for competitive games
- An astroturf pitch would provide space for Netball practice and tournaments
- An astroturf pitch would provide the option of continuing with athletics and rounders during inclement summer weather
- Increased opportunities for sports participation amongst partner primary schools
- Providing a local community facility for hockey and small sided football matches

What are we planning?

The proposal would be to construct the astroturf pitch on the lower section of the Farrer Field (see plan). This would be sized for national level competitive hockey but as it would be a 'sand dressed' Gen 2 Pitch it would be suitable for a variety of other sports including tennis, football, rugby training, athletics, rounders and netball. The pitch would be fully fenced and floodlit and would have an area for public viewing. Across the road on the main school site will be additional parking facilities with EV charging points and at some point in the near future we hope to build a new and improved sports pavilion.

• We are proposing a full size sand dressed pitch designed to national level hockey but it will also be suitable for multiple sports uses.

- The pitch will be fully fenced and floodlit
- It will be available to the local community for hire outside of school hours.



The diagram below shows the position of the astropitch on the fields to the south of St George's Road.



Benefits to the local community

We will look to improve our letting opportunities and enhance the infrastructure which is already in place to book the pitch outside of the curriculum hours. As the surface of this facility will be best suited for hockey, priority would be given to our partner club Deal Hockey who are looking to expand their junior section but cannot secure the playing space to do so. Outside of these times, the main usage would be for community 5-a-side football, tennis and netball, but we have also had interest from local cricket clubs for winter practice.

In addition, we would look to national organisations (such as England Hockey) to take advantage of our location for coaching weekends and umpire training. We will also be looking to run or offer our facilities for holiday clubs for students using the sports hall and the field; the Astroturf pitch would give us an opportunity to broaden these clubs and deliver sport-specific activities.


picked up on the day by a friend or relative, with prior notice having been given of this, as above.


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Named envelopes containing the results will be spaced out on tables running along two sides of the sports hall in alphabetical order. Given the circumstances that students have had to endure during the pandemic, the School will show a degree of flexibility around whether or not the basic entrance criteria have been met for the sixth form itself (six GCSE passes at grade 5 or above, and two of these six must include English Language or English Literature, and Mathematics) and/or particular subjects, but these will be judged on a case by case basis. The overriding consideration will be to guide students on to courses and settings that are right for them, and to ensure they are not set up for failure.
