Thank You Messages

This has been a most bizarre second half of the year. As I have said several times in my weekly meetings our students have so impressed us in the say they responded to what I said in my very first one – that they needed to step up, take the initiative for their own learning and become very good independent learners. Although the last 6 months have been so difficult for them, I am convinced that in the long term it will have made them better learners due to this.

My thanks first to our superb support staff. Many have been on site for months now, with others doing the majority of the covering of the office, and others working fully from home throughout the closure period.

Our teaching staff have been magnificent throughout, stepping up to learn how to deliver online lessons with minimal training and spending hours in front of a screen whilst having to juggle that with responsibilities at home. The feedback from parents and pupils has been overwhelmingly positive for their efforts, with many noting that the level of feedback given has been extremely impressive. Lastly, I want to thank all of our tutors for holding online meetings with their form groups over the past few weeks. I appreciate that they were done during a very busy time of year and the logistics of holding them were not always straightforward. However, having received feedback from the meetings it is obvious that they were a valuable exercise and were worth the time and effort put into making them possible.

I have been hugely impressed with how the school community have met the challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic. The regular communication from the school has been very much appreciated. The structure of the lessons has been good and sticking to the timetable has kept a semblance of routine here. The communication form the teachers has been excellent and our son has felt comfortable asking questions. He has been keen and ready each morning, probably helped by the fact he has been able to talk to his friends during the day and the timings of the lessons have stayed the same. So thank you for making this experience smoother than it could have been and for ensuring independent learning is taking place. I'm no teacher and the thought of workbooks and teaching my son all day was a frightening thought!

I have to say I am very impressed with how your school has continued and provided regular updates from before lockdown and after. I have been so impressed with the work my son has received and this has given him a focus during this time. I feel we were receiving just the right amount to keep his mind occupied whilst we are all out working. Please keep up the good work, and thank you for your continued support.

I just wanted to write a quick email to say thank you. In a time of great uncertainty, you have kept us all very well informed and made sensible decisions. The YouTube videos are a lovely touch. On a personal note thank you for this week. For us as a family it's been lovely. My daughter was able to spend all day yesterday on an RE project she wanted to work hard on. Today we've been able to spend some time playing and she's currently teaching her four year old brother piano. It has been lovely to have a week without the pressure of school work and honestly it was much needed by us.

Just wanted to drop a note to say Thank You to you all - what a fantastic job you are all doing setting and keeping on top of all the school work and keeping us informed on all relevant topics in this strange times. I know I've said it before but I think it's time to reiterate it - thank you to all of you for keeping things afloat, for doing so well in very challenging circumstances. I know my son is finding school work gives his day/week a much needed structure in these open-ended "terms".

As a parent of a year 7 pupil I have been very impressed by, and grateful for, Manwood's approach to the COVID-19 situation and home learning. Providing 'lessons' within the normal time table has been fantastic, as have the online lessons that have been provided. Staff have communicated very well with students and have been very supportive. We are so fortunate for the excellent job that you are all doing. Thank you.

Thanks so much for your continuous support in trying to keep, not just our son but all of the School children on schedule in this very difficult time. How you are all managing to do this from home and in front of a computer is truly amazing, Thank you all!! The effort it must take to co-ordinate, update and encourage all the children to keep on keeping on is astonishing. I just wanted to let you know - you have my deepest gratitude.

Just to say we think the School has dealt with the pandemic extremely well, right from the beginning

when you provided hand gel, etc. You were one step ahead of the country in general. We are very impressed how our son (Y8) is being taught via the online lessons.

I wanted to be in touch to thank you everyone at Manwood's for your hard work in very challenging circumstances over the past few months. Communication throughout this time has been excellent, with regular and comprehensive updates. It is clear that much thought has been given to how to manage this situation well, always trying to stay ahead of the curve, and thinking of the welfare of the students and staff. Our daughter has managed very well, and all in all, for her the home learning experience has been positive. I'm sure the past few months have been exhausting and frustrating at times, but I wanted to encourage you all and thank you for doing such a good job.

I would like to say the efforts made by the school to keep us informed throughout have been excellent. We have found them very reassuring. Thank you to you and all the staff at Manwood's for your ongoing efforts to keep our children's' education continuing as close to normal as possible during this unprecedented time.

I attended the Art Show in person last year and have done so this year virtually. What a brilliant idea! This virtual environment shows off the students work superbly and you are able to step back and move close to a painting which I would do normally at a gallery. Congratulations to you and your students.

Can I just say that I can't imagine what a stressful year you must have all had, with such a huge responsibility for so many children's continued education and safety - both physical and mental. However, you have all done an amazing job through such a steep learning curve, and engaging the children so that their education continued. I'm under no doubt that my children's learning has not suffered, but in fact has been enhanced through additional learnt life skills at home, due to the gift of time together. Thank you so much!

I would like to express my gratitude to the staff for the high standards they have set, and the encouragement they have given to help my son during the school closure period. The feedback on his work has helped him to understand what he has done well, and what he must do to improve. I have watched him become more confident and independent in his learning, and I am so pleased for him. He has also really enjoyed Maths Club during lockdown too. I know the decisions that the school has had to make have not been easy, but I wanted to say thank you to all of you for all that you have all done for my son, and long may it continue. I hope that all the staff are able to have some sort of rest over the holidays – you deserve it!

I just wanted to thank the staff for the fabulous job you have done over the last few months. The transition to home-learning was seamless and so quick that it made the experience for my son as a student, and us, as parents, so much easier. The speed and efficiency with which the home-learning platform was implemented and the consistency of the work set by the teachers has provided him with a 'school day' routine that has been so important during these difficult months. He doesn't have siblings at home so the experience for him was isolating at times and he did struggle with working independently but the online lessons he did have were very welcome. Thanks also for the weekly video updates as this provided further communication and in fact having watched these, I also feel more connected to the school than I have previously. I have no doubt that we made the right choice of school.

Thought I'd just take a moment to thank the staff for all their hard work and adapting to a very difficult situation over the lockdown period. My daughter and myself feel we have been well supported during this unusual time.


To see the amount of students who got involved, the amount of works submitted and the amount of positive comments and encouragement our students began to post was beyond all of our expectations.

Biology

A massive well done, to everyone who took part, for stepping up to a difficult challenge.

Business and Economics

The following report on the Young Enterprise Competition this year has been written by Katy Kenicer, the Marketing Director for this year's team - The Woods Group.

Being a part of the Young Enterprise programme was a truly enriching experience for us all. Though our YE journey encountered a number of issues the most prominent of which being the Covid-19 issue currently influencing us all, we all feel the lessons that it has taught us have been invaluable.

One of the most crucial aspects of creating a product is deciphering a gap in the market, of which there seems to be very few. We discovered through research that even with expanding media attention the general public is still dangerously unaware of how everyday home-ware and stationary items negatively impact the environment and therefore we decided to offer an alternative, \ thus the Woods group released our line of sustainable stationary and home-ware. A collection currently including geometric coasters, phone holders and rulers, with more to come, all fully customisable.

We were at an advantage regarding sales considering the business climate in Sandwich and Deal favours independent businesses, we chose to market our products, coasters specifically to restaurants resulting in two bulk orders from popular places in the area. This appeared to be a promising start and the response to our branding and marketing all showed promise. We were soon after put on lock down and like many other personal and small businesses we suffered, forced only to communicate remotely we had to halt production.

However, we were still able to compete remotely in our district and county Young Enterprise competition securing runner up for the best student company in Kent along with the best presentation award. We were also awarded 3rd place in the UK's Sustainability Award. We hope to continue with our business upon our return to school.

Maths

The UKMT have made the Junior Mathematical Challenge 2020 was completed online this year, in response to our school closure. The thresholds were 102+ Gold, 86+ Silver, 70+ Bronze.

4 pupils were awarded Gold, Henry Shek (Best in school), Jeremiah Saldonido (Best in Year 7), Babak Amin Ejlasi and George Heath. 6 were awarded Silver and 10 Bronze.

This was a unique experience and impressive scores from all.

ALUMNI NEWS

The School was saddened to hear of the passing of **Robin Garden**. He taught at Manwood's in the late 1980s and early 1990s after retiring from St. Lawrence College where he was Head of Maths. At Manwood's he taught in Maths, Physics and RE. He was also a Deacon/Chaplain at St. Clement's Church and St. Bart's Chapel in Sandwich. Robin was 93 and lived with his wife in St.George's Road.

From an article in the East Kent Mercury on 3 June 2020:

Laura Westcott, a classically trained singer and creative entrepreneur, responded to music composed by **Chris Marshall**, a former pupil of Sir Roger Manwood's School to create Somewhere in Time, a "supersonic musical safari of the senses" that is a soothing and angelic meditation to help people de-stress and drift off to sleep. The result is a "beautifully somniferous" piece according to comedian and broadcaster Stephen Fry who has become a mentor helping the former Finglesham resident handle the agoraphobia which prevented her from performing. Further praise came from actress Joanna Lumley who said: "It is literally hypnotic... I felt as calm as an egg".

Article written by **Peter Turay (2010-12)** in the Metro on 3 June 2020:

Most days I don't wake up thinking about my skin colour, but in these last few weeks it's felt inescapable. Whether it's seeing the injustice of Ahmaud Arbery being fatally shot while out for a jog in his own neighbourhood, or George Floyd being killed in broad daylight at the hands of police officers, it's pretty painful to be black right now. Painful to watch videos of their deaths shared on social media. Painful to be introduced to someone, like George Floyd, as their life is taken away from them in eight minutes and 46 seconds of brutality. But most of all, it's painful to see the same injustices arise again and again. The black community in America have gone through this tragedy repeatedly and many of them feel like they've exhausted every option.

The community – and many across the world – are angry, not just about George Floyd's death, but the structural injustices that lead to deaths like these. Structural injustice is the cornerstone of racism, and sadly, it isn't just present within the police force in the US. Right now in the UK black women are 4.3 times more likely to die from COVID-19 than their white counterparts, while black men are 4.2 times more likely to die according to research conducted by the Office for National Statistics. Studies have already shown that these results are partly due to the socio-economic disadvantages faced by black people in the UK. This week, the government published their long awaited review into the disparities in the risk and outcomes of Covid-19, which only confirmed what we already knew. People from BAME backgrounds are more likely to live in urban or deprived areas, live in overcrowded households, or work in frontline jobs – all factors that increase the chances of them being exposed and killed by the virus. But crucially, the report was silent on how these risks – which are amplified by racial and health inequalities – would be reduced or tackled. On top of that, just last week, the police watchdog announced that it would be investigating West Midlands police over their use of force on black men following multiple claims of racially motivated brutality. The allegations include a black man being tasered in the throat by a police officer while observing the scene of a car accident, a 15-year-old black

boy being punched to the floor by a police officer and a 44-year-old black man being pulled off his bicycle before being punched in the back three times while pinned against the bonnet of a police car by two officers. The manner may be less overt, but the same injustices across the Atlantic happen here in the UK. And as if these injustices aren't enough, we also have to deal with equally demeaning microaggressions that crop up in our everyday lives.

Whether it's being rejected entry into a bar or nightclub because 'you look like trouble' or having someone randomly grabbing your afro-hair as if you're some sort of exhibition, it can be tiring and belittling being black. Growing up in a predominantly white area I was always told that I wasn't 'really' black because I didn't sound or act like the black people my school friends watched on TV or in movies. It took me years to realise that there wasn't a right or wrong way to be black – it was just a generalisation, and one which looked to further ingrain a racial bias against black people. Speak to any black person you know and they will be able to name countless times they have gone through the same thing. When Stormzy said that he 100 per cent believed that there was racism in the UK, many people seemed to be outraged by a simple truth. As someone in the black community I was neither surprised by Stormzy's answer nor the damning response it got. It was typical of a society that struggles to talk openly about the issues of race and racism – instead opting for a defensiveness and awkwardness that tries to ignore, shut down or, worse, gaslight the debate.

It's exhausting for the black community. Imagine being told that racism doesn't exist in the UK when so many of us see and experience it in our everyday lives. And when we try to explain the instances of racism, we're told to be fortunate that the racism isn't as overt or blunted or widespread as it is in America. We cannot stare in shock at what's going on in the US and not take the action needed to combat racism in the UK too. As the Rapper Killer Mike said in Atlanta last week, now is the time to 'plot, plan, strategise, organise and mobilise' in order to turn George Floyd's death into a trigger for change. We cannot allow our own political leaders to dodge this conversation, like the Foreign Secretary Dominic Raab did over the weekend when he refused to comment on the numerous inflammatory comments and actions made by Donald Trump regarding the ongoing protests. This felt like even more of a kick in the teeth when Raab rightly went on to criticise the reaction of the Chinese government to protests in Hong Kong.

And crucially, we – the black community – cannot do it alone. It's been uplifting to see so many people wanting to address and educate themselves on the issues of race and racism over the past week. People who have previously been silent or unaware of their privilege wanting to speak out, show solidarity and urge for change. This is something that should give us all hope. The greater the movement against racism and injustice becomes, the harder it will be for those in positions of power to ignore our voice. So don't let this be a passing phase – take action to back up your words and help change our society for the better.



Some students may find a message in their results envelope asking them to see either Ms Pujadas-Telmon or Ms Kernick to discuss their results. Ms Kernick will be in Room C106 (the old 15) and Ms Pujadas-Telmon will be in Room C107 (the old 16) - the two rooms that face on to the 450th Garden.

Given the circumstances that students have had to endure this academic year, the School will show a degree of flexibility around whether or not the basic entrance criteria have been met for the sixth form itself (six GCSE passes at grade 5 or above, and two of these six must include English Language or English Literature, and Mathematics) and/or particular subjects, but these will be judged on a case by case basis and with reference to the prevailing Ofqual guidance at the time. The overriding consideration will be to guide students on to courses and settings that are right for them, and to ensure they are not set up for failure.
